



Death of a Pioneer.

Pleasant Litchford died at Madison, Indiana, Sunday, April 6, at the advanced age of eighty-nine years. He had lived in and near Columbus since 1831, when he moved here with his family from Campbell county, Virginia. He was a blacksmith by trade. He first camped in this city where the City Park now is, which was then a dense woods, but soon moved to a small farm which he pur-

He added to his farm, which at the time of his death contained 227 acres, valued at \$23,000, located a little over four miles from Columbus. He was a man of iron constitution; a devout Christian, the oldest member of the Second Baptist Church, Gav on street, and the last surviving person who helped to organize the colored Baptist Church of this city. He was an Elder and local preacher in his church, and a consistent member of it for seventy-eight years. During the last years of his life, as he was so situated that he could not attend church, a religious newspaper, the Gospel Messenger, and the STATE JOUR-NAL became sources of untold satisfaction to him. He was married three times; his first wife was Catherine Fisher, who bore him eleven children, seven of whom are living; his second wife, who died two years after marriage, was Frances Evens; and his third wife, who survives him, was Charlotte Stewart. At his death he had twenty-five grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.


